news from the field

In the 30 months since the onset of the global pandemic caused by COVID-19, Minnesota nonprofits continue to experience significant disruption in their operations and services. The Minnesota Council of Nonprofits (MCN) has released new data to help provide a more in-depth picture of the health of Minnesota's nonprofit sector with the 2022 Minnesota Nonprofit Economy Report - Current Conditions and COVID-19 Impact Update, Sixth Edition.

NCVLI developed *two new QuickTools* in coordination with the **International Association of Chiefs of Police** on victim advocacy in law enforcement. In these Tools you will find tips and recommendations for working with victims from experts in the field and an overview of how these early interactions proceed. *Access them here.*

The National Crime Victimization Survey (NCVS) and National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS): A complementary picture of crime in 2021 describes the similarities and differences between crime estimates derived from the BJS-sponsored NCVS, and the FBI's NIBRS. Read it here.

Carjacking Victimization, 1995–2021 - This Just the Stats report presents findings on nonfatal carjacking victimization from 1995 to 2021, based on data from BJS's National Crime Victimization Survey. It shows trend estimates of nonfatal carjacking victimizations and provides data on characteristics of carjackings and demographics of carjacking victims. It's the first report in BJS's new Just the Stats a web-published series, which

features short reports that are focused on specific topics of interest. Read it here.

Preventing Youth Hate Crimes & Identity-Based Bullying Fact Sheet - This fact sheet provides an overview of the participation OJJDP's Preventing Youth Hate Crimes & Identity-Based Bullying Initiative, including the 2021 Virtual Symposium, webinars, youth roundtables and topics to be included in a forthcoming prevention curriculum. **Read it here.**

HEAL Trafficking, in collaboration with the National Survivor Network, has developed a great new resource for event hosts aiming to facilitate safe spaces for speakers, like the experts of HEAL Speakers' Bureau, with lived experience of trafficking and/or other forms of trauma. *Read it here.*


Funding Information and Opportunities:

Join **USDOJ Office for Victims of Crime** for a webinar that will provide an overview of OVC's funding and training opportunities. Participants will also receive guidance about how to navigate the OVC website, which showcases current projects, events, funding opportunities, and equips you with tools and training resources to assist you in better serving crime victims. *Register here.*

Funded by the Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA), the Rural Violent Crime Reduction Initiative (RVCRI) is an effort to provide funding and assistance to rural law enforcement agencies seeking to reduce violent crime and address problems associated with violent crime. Funding and support are available for implementing violent crime reduction strategies, improving investigations, improving services to victims, and for enhancing collaboration between local stakeholders. RVCRI is an opportunity for law enforcement agencies who are addressing a rural violent crime problem to apply for up to \$150,000 in funding support. The RVCRI Microgrant Application will always remain open; however, the first deadline for application review is December 15. Apply here.

Esperanza United and Mujeres Latinas en Acción are awarding nearly \$12 million to approximately 30 grantees over the coming years! Eligible organizations include Hispanic and Latin@ community-based, culturally specific organizations that serve Hispanic and Latin@ survivors of sexual assault and domestic violence in the United States and its territories. The purpose of this funding is to enhance access to critical services and support for Hispanic and Latin@ survivors of sexual assault and domestic violence and address emergent needs resulting from the spread of COVID-19. **Applications are due December 16**. **Apply here**.

The January 2023 Fundamentals in Victim Services Training is a virtual training for victim advocates to develop core knowledge and skills to provide victim-centered services. By the end of this training, advocates will be able to:

- Understand the role of ongoing and historical trauma in victimization and develop skills for providing trauma-responsive advocacy to all victims of crime.
- Expand their understanding of vicarious trauma and strategies to build resilience for a sustainable career in victim services.
- Understand and examine their own Occupational Identity (OI) and identify strategies for cultivating healthy boundaries; and
- Describe key victims' rights and know how to find more information to ensure that criminal legal systems professionals are meeting statutory obligations regarding crime victims;
- Recognize and interrogate the roles of bias, privilege, and oppression in victimization and advocacy;
- Identify and honor the unique and complementary roles of community-based and systems-based advocates;

Furthermore, training participants will have opportunities to connect with one another and with experienced professionals with a range of knowledge and skills.

Expectations for the Virtual Format:

Fundamentals in Victim Services will feature interactive modules to appeal to different styles of learning, with a combination of lecture, small group work in breakout sessions, and opportunities for individual reflection.

Modules will take place live via Zoom. Attendees will be expected to actively participate, using the chat to engage with presenters and other participants, and turning on cameras

and unmuting during large group discussions and breakout sessions.

MAC will award a certificate of completion to attendees who complete all the modules. Participants are expected to complete all sessions live. If you cannot attend a live session, you must email us at **training@mnallianceoncrime.org** in advance to request an excused absence. Sessions may not be recorded.

We will apply for Continuing Legal Education (for attorneys) and Peace Officers Standings and Training (for law enforcement) credits by request. If you would like CLE or POST credits, please indicate this on your registration, or contact us at training@mnallianceoncrime.org by January 6, 2023.


