Homicide

HOMICIDE, or murder, is the non-negligent killing of one human being by another.

Current homicide totals are the lowest in 20 years, at a rate of 4.5 homicides per 100,000 people, almost half the 1995 rate.

Most homicides are committed by someone known to the victim; 10% are by an intimate partner. Most homicide victims, as well as perpetrators, are men. Minorities, young adults age 20-24, and children under 4c are disproportionate victims of homicide. More than 60% of reported murders are solved by arrest or exceptional means.

Mass shootings make up a small subset of homicide—but have garnered a great deal of media attention, particularly in recent years. Given the interest in these crimes, a separate fact sheet is devoted to Mass Casualty Shootings.







Of the **47.7%** of homicides involving a single offender and victim, most are **intra-racial**:^A







Percentage of homicides by **victim** and **offender sex**, where known^A

The highest percentage of both victims and offenders are those age **20–24** A



Of the homicides that occur in connection with another felony, **31.6%** of those murder victims are **robbed** A






Child fatalities declined by 12.7% from 2009-2013°
