Happy late winter/early spring!

I want to thank all of you who have attended any of MAC's fantastic trainings in the past two months. Becca Muskat has even more terrific learning opportunities on the calendar in the coming months. Please check out MAC's training calendar and share it with your colleagues.

The Minnesota Office of Justice (OJP) released the RFP for their competitive Crime Victim Service grant funding. Since the release of the RFP, OJP has held two information sessions that answered many questions that those applying for CVS funding may have. You can access the PPT from the information sessions here.

I want to speak to one question that was raised by several attendees.

There are efforts to significantly increase the base level of state funding for Crime Victim Services (CVS) being considered during the current legislative session. HF1437 is a bill that is jointly sponsored by all six-statewide victim service coalitions and would increase state CVS funding by \$50 million over the next biennium. Governor Walz has also proposed an \$8 million dollar increase in state funding to fill the funding gap created by

decreasing federal funding. We won't know until we near the end of the legislative session to what degree CVS funding will be increased. Cecilia Miller, director of the grant's unit at OJP, addressed the question about how potential increases to CVS funding will affect the current funding process. While the RFP clearly states that this current RFP is not intended to fund an expansion of services of current grantee programs, OJP did clearly articulate that programs should be requesting funding that includes increases for costs of living, costs of goods, and services. Applicants should also represent the funding needed to fully staff an existing program. OJP is aware that many programs are not fully staffed for a variety of reasons, and programs are encouraged to request funding that would address staffing issues that are related to not being adequately funded.

In short, OJP wants applicants to submit budget requests that will comprehensively support the program for the 12-month funding period from October 1, 2023 – September 30, 2024. Cecilia Miller stated "OJP can't fund what hasn't been requested in the grant application."

OJP is currently recruiting individuals to serve as grant reviewers. They are currently in need of approximately 100 grant reviewers. If your organization is going to be applying for funding through the current RFP, individuals ARE ELIGIBLE to serve as a grant reviewer. If you are interested in being a grant reviewer, links will be up on the OJP site soon!

As always, thank you for the work you are all doing to meet the needs of crime victim throughout Minnesota!

REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS (RFP)

The purpose of this Request for Proposals (RFP) is to solicit applications for funding to provide direct services to crime victims in Minnesota, and assist people impacted by crime who have difficulty accessing services or may not know services exist. Various types of agencies interact with crime victims, and applicants are encouraged to think broadly about locations from which advocacy may be provided to reach more crime victims, such as: homeless shelters, family justice centers, juvenile justice agencies or detention centers serving criminal justice involved youth, college or university sexual and domestic violence centers, etc.

Two information sessions were held on Wednesday, February 22, 2023 and Thursday, February 23, 2023. If you weren't able to attend these there are PowerPoint slides on the OJP page for you to download or **you can download here**.

The RFP itself is also on the OJP site and you can download it here too.

VOIC-S THERAPY FOR CRIME VICTIMS.

VOIC-S is a program of the Minnesota Center for Psychology designed specifically to address the mental health needs of crime victims. The therapists who are part of the VOIC-S program utilize trauma informed, evidence-based therapies in helping survivors reduce fear, anxiety, and other symptoms of the victimization. MCP recognizes that initiating therapy, particularly while suffering the impact of a traumatic experience, can be very challenging.

Most types of insurance are accepted, as is private pay. MCP also submits claims to the MN Board of Reparations for eligible payments.



VOIC-S is a program of the Minnesota Center for Psychology designed specifically to address the mental health needs of crime victims. The therapists who are part of the VOIC-S program utilize trauma informed, evidence-based therapies in helping survivors reduce fear, anxiety, and other symptoms of the victimization. MCP recognizes that initiating therapy, particularly while suffering the impact of a traumatic experience, can be very challenging. MCP's intake team, administrative staff, and therapists seek to reduce barriers by verifying insurance benefits, offering flexible options for the intake process, and offering in person and tele-health sessions.

OJP Released information on identity theft in February;

Identity theft and identity fraud refer to crimes in which an individual misuses another person's personal information for fraudulent or deceptive purposes, usually for financial gain.

The impact of identity theft goes beyond financial losses and damaged credit.

Victims may struggle to find employment or housing due to the negative consequences of the crime. They can also experience significant emotional trauma and physical stress.

Here are some useful resources on identity theft:

- Victims of Identity Theft, 2018 This report, based on data from the 2018
 Identity Theft Supplement of the National Crime Victimization Survey, details
 identity theft experiences of people ages 16+, including type of crime,
 information source, financial loss, other impacts, and lifetime prevalence of
 identity theft.
- Recover Me if You Can: Assessing Services to Victims of Identity Theft. This
 project studied impact and quality of services for U.S. victims of identity crime
 with the goal of improving victim experiences and finding effective support
 methods.
- 2020 National Identity Theft Victims Assistance Network (NITVAN) Identity
 Theft Coalition Building Toolkit. This toolkit is the result of a four-year federal
 effort to provide service providers, advocates, and professionals with a
 comprehensive guide for assisting identity theft victims. It's designed to
 improve the capacity to address victims' rights and needs through coalition
 building.

National Economic Justice Report: Beyond Workforce Development for Survivors of Trafficking. (Available in English, Spanish, French, and Simplified Chinese). This was a national study with 102 survivor participants (with an intentional focus on survivor, BIPOC, LGBTQ+, and language justice inclusion) on what employers can do to better support survivors of trafficking and shift from short-term economic empowerment to long-term sustainable economic justice and career paths.

Bolder Advocacy's Free Resources for Legislative Sessions Hit the ground running this legislative session with our free Practical Guidance State Law Resources, designed to help nonprofits navigate how lobbying rules may apply to their work. In this Texas legislative session, for instance, nonprofits have a unique opportunity to engage in lobbying to fight for legislation, including gun control and reproductive rights.

Roots of Violence: A Changemakers Alliance Discussion Series by Mikki Morrissette 2/22/2023. What does the survivor need to feel safe again? What do accountability, justice, and healing mean to them?

The Council on Criminal Justice released its 2022 year-end crime trend report, which examined data from 35 major U.S. cities and found that homicide and most other violent crimes decreased last year, but robberies and theft offenses rose as the nation emerged from the coronavirus pandemic. Funding and Internship Opportunities:

FY 2023 Coordinated Tribal Assistance Solicitation (CTAS). Closing Date March 28, 2023 This solicitation provides federally recognized tribes and tribal consortia an opportunity to apply for funding to aid in developing a comprehensive and coordinated approach to public safety and victimization. Most of the Department of Justice's (DOJ's) existing tribal government-specific programs are included in and available through this single Coordinated Tribal Assistance Solicitation (CTAS). CTAS is not a program but a single solicitation to allow tribes to apply to seven separate grant programs from four grant-making offices. Each tribe or tribal

consortium may submit only one CTAS application. This application can include proposals for project funding under one or more purpose areas (PAs). As such, multiple awards may be made in response to a single application. *More information and application here.*

Human Trafficking Youth Prevention Education (HTYPE) Demonstration Program. The goal of the HTYPE Demonstration Program is to fund local education agencies (LEA) to develop and implement programs to prevent human trafficking victimization by providing skills-based human trafficking training and education for school staff and students. The LEA must work in partnership with a non-profit or nongovernmental organization and consult with local law enforcement to develop a Human Trafficking School Safety Protocol. The deadline to apply is **April 27, 2023**. **More information**.

OVW's FY 2023 Training and Services to End Violence and Abuse Against Individuals with Disabilities and Deaf People Program Solicitation. OVW's Disability Grant Program (CFDA# 16.529) is to create sustainable change within and between organizations that improves the response to individuals with disabilities and Deaf individuals who are victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking, and to hold perpetrators of such crimes accountable. Specifically, the purpose of the program is to provide training, consultation, and information on domestic violence, dating violence, stalking, sexual assault, and abuse by caregivers against individuals with disabilities and Deaf people and to enhance direct services to such individuals. Eligible applicants include states, units of local government, Indian tribal governments, tribal organizations, nonprofit organizations, and victim service providers. More information.

The Safe Harbor Shelter and Housing Request for Proposals (RFP) administered by the Office of Economic Opportunity at the MN Department of Human Services is now published. This request for proposals is to provide specialized outreach, emergency shelter, and supportive housing services to youth age 24 and younger experiencing sexual exploitation for the time period of July 1, 2023-June 30, 2025. 

Fundamentals in Victim Services 201

The March 2023 Fundamentals in Victim Services 201 Training is a virtual training for experienced victim advocates to expand and deepen their core knowledge and skills in providing victim-centered services. This training is designed for victim advocates who have been in the field for 5+ years. By the end of this training, advocates will be able to:

- Understand the neurobiology of trauma in victimization and develop skills for providing trauma-responsive advocacy to all victims of crime.
- Expand their understanding of vicarious trauma and strategies to build resilience to sustain their career in victim services.
- Understand and examine their own Occupational Identity (OI) and identify strategies for cultivating healthy boundaries; and
- Describe the reparations process and have a detailed understanding of the current statutes regarding reparations
- Recognize and interrogate the roles of bias, privilege, and oppression in their daily work
- Understand the ways in which evaluation and grant reporting can be effective and culturally responsive.

Furthermore, training participants will have opportunities to connect with one another and with experienced professionals with a range of knowledge and skills.
